Domain 2: Multi-tiered System of Support
Feature 1: Inclusive Academic Instruction

Schools with Inclusive Academic Instruction provide a variety of instructional and assessment options that promote student learning. General and specialized educators work together to provide high-quality curriculum and instruction to all students. Teachers regularly measure growth and personalize learning environments according to student strengths and opportunities to improve. Using formal and informal assessment data, educators work in teams to make decisions about students' future instructional needs. Teachers monitor individual student progress, and when needed, provide additional support through more or different instruction that is matched to students' current performance. These options may involve individual or group learning, varied levels of difficulty, or different ways for the students to demonstrate what they know and can do. Students may receive different options for learning, including varied access, processing, and testing options, which maximize opportunities for success. Inclusive Academic Instruction means the whole school staff works together to meet every student's instructional needs.

DENTAL HEALTH VISIT
