Domain 3: Integrated Educational Framework Feature 1: Fully Integrated Organizational Structure

A Fully Integrated Organizational Structure means full participation in the general education curriculum for all students. Unified systems, services, and practices meet the needs of diverse learners more efficiently and effectively than separate systems. In an inclusive school, general and specialized education programs come together as a cohesive whole to promote the success of any and all students. Examples of integrated structures include redefined roles for paraeducators that allow them to support all students; every student fully participates in grade level classrooms, where they receive instruction and support; and peers with a wide range of cognitive and physical differences work together to mutually support and encourage each other in learning. Additionally, school resources are allocated based on individual student needs, not a label or a one-size fits all approach. When students, educators, support personnel, and families work together in a Fully Integrated *Organizational Structure* ALL students experience greater academic and social outcomes.
